PROGRAM NOTES

Dmitri Kabalevsky: Overture to "Colas Breugnon"

The overture is a brisk, brilliant, and high-spirited piece, written as the curtain raiser of Kabalevsky's opera based on Romain Rolland's lusty novel of life in Burgundy, France, during the 16th century. The hero of the story has something in him of both Robin Hood and François Villon (a French lyric poet who was banished from Paris in 1463), and Kabalevsky has written music admirably fitting this character. The arrangement was created for the Florida State University Symphonic Band and was premiered on April 17, 2002. The professional premiere by the Dallas Wind Symphony, Jerry Junkin conducting, was on November 19, 2002, at the Meyerson Symphony Center in Dallas, Texas. - Program Note by Everett Kisinger from "Band Music Notes"

Joseph Schwantner: *New Morning for the World: Daybreak of Freedom* is Joseph Schwantner's 1982 tribute to Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. The idea of a work honoring Dr. King was first suggested to Schwantner in 1981 by Robert Freeman, director of the Eastman School of Music. Schwantner writes:

"I was excited by the opportunity to engage my work with the profound and deeply felt words of Dr. King, a man of great dignity and courage whom I had long admired. The words that I selected for the narration were garnered from a variety of Dr. King's writings, addresses, and speeches, and drawn from a period of more than a decade of his life. These words, eloquently expressed by the thrust of his oratory, bear witness to the power and nobility of Martin Luther King Jr's ideas, principles, and beliefs. This work of celebration is humbly dedicated to his memory."

New Morning for the World was composed under a commission from the American Telephone and Telegraph Company for an East Coast tour undertaken by the Eastman Philharmonia. The orchestra first performed the work on 15 January 1983, in the Concert Hall of the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, in Washington, D.C., and was narrated by the renowned Pittsburgh Pirates baseball star Willie Stargell. Following the premiere performance, the work was subsequently introduced in Philadelphia, New York, Pittsburgh, and Rochester, N.Y.

The work has received hundreds of performances by major orchestras throughout the United States and has been narrated by such noted individuals as Coretta Scott King, Yolanda King, James Earl Jones, Maya Angelou, Danny Glover, Robert Guillaume, Alfre Woodard, and Vernon Jordan. The version for wind ensemble was premiered on 20 April 2007 by the Florida State University Wind Orchestra in Tallahassee, Florida, Nikk Pilato conducting.

Viet Cuong: Deciduous

For a long time after my father passed away, I felt like I had "lost my leaves." In the way that leaves harness light to create energy for trees and plants, I felt like I had so little left to harness creatively. Many days I feared those leaves would never grow back. After struggling for months to write, I finally found some healing while creating *Deciduous*. This involved revisiting chord progressions that brought me solace as a child and activating them in textures that I have enjoyed exploring as an adult. The piece cycles through these chord progressions, building to a moment where it's stripped of everything and must find a way to renew itself. While I continue to struggle with this loss, I have come to understand that healing is not so much a linear process as it is a cyclical journey, where, without fail, every leafless winter is followed by a spring.

David Maslanka: *Give Us This Day: A Short Symphony for Wind Ensemble* The words "give us this day" are, of course, from the Lord's Prayer, but the inspiration for this music is Buddhist. I have recently read a book by the Vietnamese Buddhist monk Thich Nhat Hanh (pronounced "Tick Not Hahn") entitled For a Future to be Possible. His premise is that a future for the planet is only possible if individuals become deeply mindful of themselves, deeply connected to who they really are. While this is not a new idea, and something that is an ongoing struggle for everyone, in my estimation it is the issue for world peace. For me, writing music, and working with people to perform music, are two of those points of deep mindfulness.

Music makes the connection to reality, and by reality I mean a true awakeness and awareness. *Give Us This Day* gives us this very moment of awakeness and aware aliveness so that we can build a future in the face of a most dangerous and difficult time.

I chose the subtitle "Short Symphony for Wind Ensemble" because the music really isn't programmatic in nature. It has a full-blown symphonic character, even though there are only two movements. The music of the slower first movement is deeply searching, while that of the highly energized second movement is at times both joyful and sternly sober.

ABOUT THE ARTISTS

Kraig Alan Williams is in his thirteenth year as Associate Professor of conducting, serving as conductor and artistic director of the Grammy-nominated Rutgers Wind Ensemble. Dr. Williams served as the Director of University Bands from 2011-2016, and from 2019-2021 he was the interim conductor and music

director of *HELIX!* New Music Ensemble. Williams's duties also include teaching classes in graduate and undergraduate conducting, music education and aural skills. Maintaining an active schedule as a guest conductor, clinician, and lecturer, Williams has appeared in those capacities in more than 18 states and with prominent ensembles such as the Dallas Wind Symphony and the United States Air Force Band. He received a Doctor of Musical Arts degree from The University of Texas at Austin, studying with Jerry Junkin. He joined the conducting faculty at the Brevard Music Center in 2001, and in 2008 was named the Director of Band Activities and Chamber Winds. Williams regularly serves as a cover conductor for the program under the Artistic Director, Keith Lockhart, and continues to receive critical acclaim for his work with the music center's orchestras and wind ensembles.
